The Bahamas Responds to Emergencies and Disasters

Hurricane Ike passed through the Bahamas in August 2008 and caused millions of dollars worth of damage to the infrastructure of the islands as well as a great deal of physical damage to the local population. The [National Emergency Medical Service](#), which provides all emergency services in the Bahamas, contacted FAVACA to help train emergency personnel on new techniques to drive emergency vehicles during times of disaster as well as methods to evacuate people from an emergency situation in Grand Bahamas



and New Providence. Former FAVACA Volunteer of the Year Captain Wayne Watts, a captain from [Jacksonville Fire and Rescue](#), agreed to provide the requested training. Watts has provided similar trainings in the past several years but this training expanded on previous trainings by focusing on emergency rescue driving during times of national emergencies. Watts traveled to [Nassau, Bahamas](#) to train 10 emergency service personnel and provided the same training to 15 emergency service personnel in [Freeport, Bahamas](#). Watts traveled to the Bahamas from November 25- December 1, 2008.

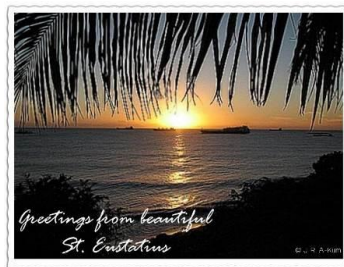
Belize Receives Elderly Care Plan

In 2003, Martha Pelaez volunteered with FAVACA in Belize to work with the [National Council on Aging \(NCA\)](#) to develop of 5 year national strategic plan for services provided to a rapidly aging population. The NCA's primary purpose is to advocate for the changes that are necessary in Belizean society that will improve the quality of life for older people now and for future generations. The NCA is in the final year of their 5 year plan and contacted FAVACA to find an expert who could help to evaluate their success in implementing the plan. The volunteer was also requested to work with NCA's staff and board members to develop another [5-10 year strategic national plan on aging](#). 2007 FAVACA [Volunteer of the Year, Martha Pelaez](#) of Miami Florida, agreed to provide the requested training and offer her suggestions in designing and implementing a new strategic plan. Pelaez, the Director of the [Healthy Aging Initiative of the Health Foundation of South Florida](#) and a retired gerontologist with the [Pan American Health Organization](#), traveled to Indian Creek located in the province of [Toledo, Belize](#) November 26-November 29, 2008.



Hospitality Center in St. Eustatius Cooks Up A Training

The [St. Eustatius Tourism Center](#) recently constructed a hospitality school which trains recently graduated high school students to become formalized with the necessary skills to enter into the hospitality industry. The department which focuses on food services at the Tourism Center expressed their need for an updated and improved curriculum. The Tourism Center asked FAVACA to provide an expert in hospitality management and cooking instruction to work with the director of the school as well as with many of the students and professional cooks from local restaurants and hotels. Dr. Joseph West of Hollywood, Florida agreed to volunteer for FAVACA. Dr. West is the



Dean of the [School of Hospitality and Tourism Management at Florida International University](#) and he has made numerous international, national and regional presentations, published a variety of articles in leading industry and academic journals, including three chapters in three hospitality textbooks as well as co-authoring a book on competition and strategy in the hospitality industry. Dr. West traveled to [Oranjestad, St. Eustatius](#) from December 5-13, 2008 to conduct trainings on proper kitchen safety, sanitation, and a variety of cooking skills. A total of 40 students, local chefs, and teachers from the Tourism Center benefited from the training.



FAVACA Staff Explores Professional Exchanges for Nicaraguans

FAVACA was awarded a contract from the State Department to develop an exchange program targeting indigenous and minority populations in Nicaragua. The professional exchange program is designed to capitalize on this emerging tourism sector by educating young entrepreneurs engaged in the industry and other tourism-related businesses and organizations to build their business skills that lead to stronger, more efficient enterprises. Director of Programs Demian Pasquarelli and Program Coordinator Angelina Klouthis traveled to [Puerto Cabezas, Nicaragua](#) to meet with Pana-Pana, FAVACA's in-country partner, to discuss the scope of the project and to work on the recruitment of potential participants. Pana-Pana provides micro-loans to small nonprofit organizations in the North Atlantic region. FAVACA also met with the local tourism association, CANTUR, and president Orlando Hislop provided a briefing on tourism concerns for the region. Carlos Aleman Cunningham, President of the North Atlantic Regional Autonomous Court. (Consejo Regional Autonomo del Atlantico Norte) (CRAAN) met with FAVACA to discuss the exchange program and the potential for other development missions in the area. FAVACA staff met with two women's groups, Asociacion of Indigenous women of the Atlantic Coast (AMICA) and MYRAB which focuses on supporting indigenous women especially in the field of obtaining legal assistance. Pasquarelli and Klouthis met with [World Bank](#) representative Richard Anossa. After meeting with Anossa, FAVACA staff members talked with Eric Villalobos, [US SOUTHCOM](#) regional coordinator to discuss the potential for FAVACA to help support US SOUTHCOM projects in the region. Before leaving Nicaragua, a meeting was held with [Ambassador Callahan](#) and Cultural Attaché, Michelle G Los Banos-Jardina as well as a meeting with Steven Fondreist, Chief, Trade and Agribusiness Office for [USAID](#).
